## WHO ARE WE?

Mechon Hadar offers a vision of a deeply committed Judaism, grounded in Torah study and prayer, that engages with authenticity and integrity with the modern world and its values.

Mechon Hadar was born out of a vision - a vision for a world where our deep commitment to Judaism guides us in confronting the challenges of the present; a world where serious and in-depth Torah study strengthens the connection between the Jewish people and the Torah of Israel, and new and old melodies of prayer nourish the spirituality of our communities; a world where every individual within the Jewish people, regardless of gender, is a citizen in all realms of Jewish life, where the embodiment of religious commitment is Hesed and concern for others.

Mechon Hadar serves as an anchor for prayer communities and individuals seeking to realize a committed, egalitarian, intellectually rigorous, and grounded Jewish way of life. This path is characterized by a bold and authentic connection between the three pillars of Jewish life: Torah – A Torah-based, scholarly, and halakhic approach that courageously responds to the challenges of modern life and times; Avodah – Service of God expressed through a rich spiritual world, through Halakhah, and through realms of prayer, song, and creativity; and Hesed – A profound sense of responsibility toward others, rooted in the recognition of the

## **OUR STORY**

Mechon Hadar was founded in the United States in the summer of 2007. From its inception, Israelis have been integral to its community, expressing a deep yearning for the kind of Jewish life Hadar fosters. As the number of Israeli graduates increased, so too did awareness of this way of life in Israel, along with a growing need for a local institution that could uphold, sustain, and promote this approach. These developments underscored the understanding that significant change in the Jewish world would only be sustainable if it had roots in both Israel and the Diaspora.

#### **Our Successes**

Mechon Hadar was founded in Israel as a non-profit organization in 2018. Since then, we have cultivated a vibrant and thriving Beit Midrash in Jerusalem, offering a diverse array of classes, intensive programs, seminars, and learning opportunities. Our educational initiatives extend beyond Jerusalem, with learning centers in cities such as Be'er Sheva and Tel Aviv. We also foster a network of approximately 55 prayer communities across the country from the North

to the South, providing support and resources. Additionally, we produce a variety of printed and digital materials to engage a broad and diverse audience.

Building on our accomplishments, we aim to embark on a new and expansive chapter. We invite readers to join us and dream about expanding and sharing Hadar's unique vision.

We believe that this vision will serve as a cornerstone for the future of committed and contemporary Jewish life.

This vision is not merely an abstract idea - but a way of life for individuals, families, and communities, who aspire to ground their lives in Jewish action and meaning. This plan charts our path towards realizing this vision and the aspirations it represents.



## THE CHALLENGE

Hadar emerged in response to the pervasive challenges and tensions within contemporary Jewish life. Confronted by the familiar contours of the Jewish world, we questioned the inherent contradictions: Why must rigorous Torah study and open-mindedness be mutually exclusive? How can the integration of scholarly insights and religious belief be reconciled? Why does the pursuit of gender equality necessitate a compromise of halakhic commitments? Where does the chasm arise between the observance of commandments, the pursuit of Torah learning, and the fulfillment of interpersonal, human obligations? While some of these challenges are perennial, others are uniquely products of our time.

Hadar was established out of a persistent search for a Judaism that would not force one to choose between these options.

Israel is grappling with a complex reality marked by widening social disparities, entrenched ideological divides, and a hyper-polarized political discourse. The nation's inability to foster a nuanced, inclusive, and less adversarial public conversation is particularly acute during times of crisis. The ascendance of a religiously

and gender-conservative ideology in the public sphere has exacerbated gender inequality, as women remain underrepresented in positions of leadership across government, politics, the military, and Jewish institutions. In a country where religion and state are intertwined, the Torah has been instrumentalized as a means to consolidate power and authority. While one segment of the Jewish-Israeli spectrum views the Torah as irrelevant to contemporary life, devoid of guidance or inspiration, another employs it to justify violence, rather than to serve as a warning against it.

In a time of such profound crisis, Hadar's Jewish vision is more vital than ever and can serve as a tool for social cohesion in Israel and unity among the Jewish people as a whole.






## **OUR VALUES**

**HADAR'S VISION:** Jews, in communities throughout Israel and the world, are living meaningful lives of Torah, Avodah, and Hesed.

**HADAR'S MISSION:** Hadar empowers Jews to create and sustain vibrant, practicing, egalitarian communities of Torah, Avodah, and Hesed.

Hadar offers a vision of Judaism that aims to elevate us above conventional dichotomies and add vitality to contemporary lewish life. We believe in a Judaism nourished by serious, inviting Torah study that is intellectually broad and religiously and halakhically committed. We have built a model that is halakhically observant, committed to mitzvot and rooted in gender equality, one grounded in a specific religious path and accountable to and engaging with all Jews. We see the particular claims of the Jewish tradition as leading us to a place of more universal human concern. Against the recurring challenges of modern Jewish life, we have always sought integration of tradition and self, speaking to our present moment in the dialect of eternity. We believe that in order to breathe life into a vibrant Jewish spirit, we must invest in the core of lewish wisdom and action.









## THEORY OF CHANGE

After 18 years of operation in the US and over a decade of expanding our activities in Israel, we understand better than ever where we have made a difference and where new strategies are needed.


To effect long-lasting social change, organizations must (1) impact people as individuals, (2) influence established organizations, and (3) build new and distinct spaces.



## SHARE RELIGIOUS VISION

#### **Rationale**

Hadar's religious vision is made for this moment. We offer authenticity through deep learning; transparency through unflinching honesty; an embrace of all lews in a shared covenant; and wisdom from our tradition's blueprint for meaning and purpose. Those who have come to know Hadar—whether online or in person, in local communities or through national programs—have been profoundly impacted by this vision, finding deeper meaning in Jewish life, and growing their commitment to meaningful practice. Over the next four years, we aim to share this vision broadly, aligning our programming, publishing, and communications to spread our distinctive message.

#### What Success Looks Like

- Increased awareness, clarity, and understanding of our core vision, and of Hadar as an accessible, generative, and trusted home for this vision
- Programs, experiences, and content increase the number of people who are eager and ready to live Hadar's vision
- Promoting egalitarian religious life in Israel

## Objectives

- Supporting, empowering, and serving egalitarian and partnership communities in Israel as an expression of Hadar's religious vision
- Organizing a National Hadar Shabbaton open to the general public in Israel
- Providing diverse avenues for individuals nationwide to connect with Hadar's mission
- Communicating Hadar's religious values clearly and inclusively within an Israeli framework
- Fostering the publication of works that embody Hadar's vision

## BUILD FLAGSHIPS

Create and support distinct, compelling, and sustained structures that enable Jews to live out Hadar's vision of Judaism.

#### Rationale

As we cultivate a groundswell of individuals seeking to enact aspects of Hadar's vision and values in their homes and Jewish communities, we must also build flagship institutions that can serve as replicable religious models. We will invest in model communities and institutions through which individuals and families can integrate commitments of Torah, Avodah, and Hesed into their daily lives, building joyous and spiritual spaces that anchor their Judaism.



#### **What Success Looks Like**

A range of vibrant Jewish organizations and programs enable people to live Hadar's religious vision in community across all stages of life.

## Objectives

- Expanding the Jerusalem beit midrash community to include a wider range of learners by offering new programs, redesigning existing programs, organizing events, and providing opportunities for daily prayer
- Supporting the establishment of a new prayer community aligned with the values of Mechon Hadar
- Conducting research and preparations for the launch of a pre-army yeshiva program
- Developing a new learning center outside of Jerusalem

## Examples of Hadar US Objectives

- Launch post-high school Gap Year Program in Israel
- Support rabbis to establish several entrepreneurial shul communities
- Expand Hadar's NYC Yeshiva to include a broader range of learners







#### GOAL 3

## **CULTIVATE LEADERSHIP**

Seed the Jewish world with rabbinic, scholarly, and community leaders who embody Hadar's vision and support vibrant communities.

#### **Rationale**

The future we envision requires a cadre of leaders with a strong religious vision, and the energy, commitment, and enthusiasm to make this vision into a lived reality. We will grow this group of leaders by investing in new initiatives designed to attract and support the development of professional and lay leaders.



#### What Success Looks Like

Hadar-trained leaders will support a growing number of thriving Jewish communities



#### Objectives

- Supporting community leaders in their professional development through training opportunities
- Developing and piloting new programs and videos for prayer leaders, with a specific focus on expanding female leadership in prayer
- Supporting leadership among Mechon Hadar alumni and fostering collaborations to share Hadar's vision more broadly
- Providing micro-grants to alumni and the broader Hadar community to support the realization of Hadar's religious vision

## **Examples of Hadar US Objectives**

- Launch a 4-year program for entrepreneurial rabbis that includes study and support in the field
- Expand tefillah leadership and empowerment initiatives, including prayer leader fellowship and masterclass videos from Hadar's Rising Song Institute

### Strengthen Hadar's internal organizational infrastructure to support the organizational strategic goals

#### Rationale

Creating a sustainable model for growth requires investing in infrastructure—including staff, fundraising, marketing, and communications—and ensuring a culture of evaluation that seeks to regularly assess the impact of our programs and initiatives.

## Objective 1:

## Creating a comprehensive technological infrastructure that helps expand the organization's activities

- Develop a cycle of continuous improvement, and ensure the alignment of all programs and systems
- Establish a plan for ongoing evaluation through both internal evaluation and the engagement of outside evaluators
- Increase institutional efficiency by investing in proven technology and prioritizing formal coordination across programs

### Objective 2:

### Revenue generation

- Grow individual giving by 75% by expanding regional and planned giving
- Ensure steady growth in foundation support by cultivating new relationships
- Grow earned revenue by 100%, driven by new programs



### Objective 3:

#### Invest in staff

- Increase operations and administrative staffing
- Establish programs to support positive staff engagement
- Build professional development and training opportunities

## Objective 4:

### Marketing, communications, and engagement

- Bolster relational engagement with the broad range of communities participating in Hadar programming

- Clarify and build distribution plan for books and content from Hadar faculty






## HADAR JOURNEYS

## CONCLUSION

This document articulates the mission of the Mechon Hadar for the coming years, during which we need voices that can speak in a religious, spiritual, and humanistic language to the entirety of the Jewish people. The moment demands not only perseverance in our original mission, but also daring, aspiration, and risk-taking. In a time of division and crisis, we need an articulated religious vision that is strong and clear, while highlighting multiple voices and perspectives. In a rootless age, we need communities that people can call home, whether in their local neighborhoods, in the educational institutions, or as part of national networks. We need to invest in leaders who will devote their lives to the holy task of serving the Jewish people and, through them, the broader world. In an age of Jewish insecurity about the future, investing in both Israel and the Diaspora as a strategic partnership for the sake

of Jewish flourishing is more important than ever.
